

CHRISTMAS AND OTHER HOLIDAYS AROUND THE WORLD



beginning the unit

Begin by showing your students a globe and discussing towns, states, countries, continents, etc. Talk about how we are free to visit other states, but when we want to visit another country, it requires some paperwork. Briefly explain that in order to visit other countries we must have a passport. Ask students why they think this is.

Then, introduce the Christmas Around the World Unit by telling students they will be "visiting" several countries to learn about their cultures and holiday traditions, and in order to do this, they will have to apply for a passport and be granted one before they are allowed to travel. Depending on your time constraints, you may want to introduce the unit and have students fill out their passport application on day one and then on day two meet with students to approve their applications and grant passports. When filling out applications, you will need to guide students through the passport. When I approve applications, I stamp the top of the application with a stamp that says 'Approved' or either write it in red ink.

using the passports

Once students have been approved for their passport, hand them a copy of their passport. First, have students fill out the information portion of the passport and place their photo in the section as well. As for students' passport photos, I always get a few extra photo stickers of students from portraits at the beginning of the school year, and they are excellent for this project!

Students can then color the front of their passport. When finished, they should place their passport (and application, if you choose) in their suitcase. Remind them to take good care of their passport and not lose it because they must have it to enter countries during their trip!

When students are ready to visit a country, have them get their passports out and ready. When entering, the "border control" should welcome them to the country and stamp their passport. You can use the included labels (designed for Avery Multi-Use Labels 5410 – 1" round) or purchase a set of Christmas stamps to use (Oriental Trading has a great set <u>here</u>!)

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
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





























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
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
It is always a good idea to keep a journal/scrapbook of one's travels, and this trip around the world is no different.


Make a copy of the trip journal for each student. Included are two different templates: one with an entire page for writing (intended for older students) and one with sections for drawing and writing (intended for younger students). After each country visit, have students pull out their trip journal and write about where they visited and what they learned.
This will not only allow students to practice their writing skills, it will also help them remember the Christmas traditions in each country and what each craft represents. Parents will love getting to read their child's journal as well!

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








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Since this is a "trip around the world", your students will need a suitcase to carry all of those goodies they will collect as they visit each country!

Materials To Construct Suitcase (For Teacher):

•Four sheets of 12"x18" tan construction paper or two 12"x18" sheets of tan cardstock

•Copy of Suitcase Handles – 2 per side for durability (Use Cardstock for durability)

•Copy of Tag

•Hole Punch •Stapler

Materials To Construct Suitcase (For Student):

Copy of Map
Glue Stick
Crayons

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Teacher Instructions

The teacher will pre-make the suitcases.

- Staple together four sheets of 12"x18" tan construction paper (two for each side – this makes the suitcase more sturdy) or two 12"x18" sheets of tan cardstock.
- 2. Next, staple two suitcase handles in each inside of the top of the suitcase.
- Punch a hole into a tag and tie it onto one of the suitcase handles using a piece of yarn.

Student Instructions

- 1. Prior to giving students their suitcases, give each student a world map and go over the countries they will be visiting. For each country they will be visiting, have them color it on their map and also write the name of the country. Students then glue the map to the front of their suitcase.
- 2. Finally, have students write their name on their tag and decorate both sides of their suitcase with Christmas drawings.




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







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

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Chinese Lantern

Purpose: Only about one percent of the people in China are Christians, so most only know a few things about Christmas. Not every home will have a Christmas Tree (or even celebrate!). If people do have a tree it is normally a plastic one (it may be called 'A Tree of Light') and might be decorated with paper chains, paper flowers, and paper lanterns.

*For an extra culture experience, ask a local Chinese restaurant if they would be interested in donating fortune cookies, chopsticks, and a sample of Chinese food for the kids to try. You can also purchase these items for cheap from Oriental Trading if needed and add to a small Chinese noodle sample.

Materials:

•8"x11" Sheet of Red Construction Paper


•Scissors


•Stapler

Procedures:

- 1. Fold the sheet of construction paper in half, hot-dog style. Open the sheet.
- 2. Cut off a small strip off of the bottom of the sheet of paper. Put this aside.
- 3. Fold the larger sheet again along the crease.
- 94. On the closed side (along the crease) cut slits about 2-3 centimeters apart, almost all the way to the other side.
- 5. Open the sheet up and fold hamburger--style. Staple or tape both sidestogether.
- Finally, tape of staple the small slit of paper cut earlier to the inside of the lantern to make a handle.







Although more people (1.3 billion) call China home than anywhere else in the world, only about 13 million celebrate Christmas. Most people in China know very little about the holiday.

If you were to visit China around Christmas, you would probably only see Christmas decorations in big cities such as Beijing and Shanghai. Many stores and streets in those areas are decorated.



Although China, officially known as the People's Republic of China, is the world's most populous country with 1.3 billion people, only about one percent (13 million) of the people in China are Christians. Therefore, most only know a few things about Christmas.

Many department stores and streets in those areas are decorated. In China, not every home will have a Christmas Tree or even celebrate. 
Through the years another tradition that has been catching on is giving loved ones apples wrapped in colored paper. In China, Christmas Eve is called 'Ping An Ye', which means silent night. So what does this have to do with apples? Well, in Chinese, apple is 'Ping Guo', which sounds very similar, and as a result, many people in China give apples to others on Christmas Eve.

The most popular winter holiday in China is Chinese New Year. It celebrates the end of winter and is usually around February. It ends with the Lantern Festival. Many children make paper lanterns at this time.

Although China may not have many Christmas traditions, the ones they do have are very special.

Christmas Cracker

Purpose: Christmas crackers are pulled at a Christmas dinner table or party. Each person will have their own cracker and will keep its contents Included contents are usually a colored paper hat or crown; a small toy, small trinket, and a joke, riddle or piece of trivia on a small strip of paper.

Materials:

Toilet Paper Tube (Can use for each cracker or just as a guide)
 Colored tissue paper (One sheet should make two)
 Ribbon

•Contents Per Cracker: a small toy, a small piece of wrapped candy, a small ornament, and a joke or piece of trivia

Procedures:

- 1. Depending on the number of students you have, you may want to pre-make these or begin pre-making them.
- 2. Wrap tissue paper around toilet paper tube and twist ends.
- 3. Secure one end of tissue paper with ribbon. Leave the other open to place the cracker contents.

4. Depending on how many toilet paper tubes and students you have, you might find it best to remove the tube at this point after using it as a guide or simply leaving it. Leaving it will make the cracker look nicer but will also most likely stay intact when the cracker is pulled apart.

- 5. Place contents inside. You could also have a table set up with content sections and have students place contents inside. If you choose to do this, students can make a cracker for a classmate or a student in another grade (if you switch classes while traveling, you could change out contents for each class to make it a surprise!
- 6. Once all contents are placed, twist the other end of the tube and secure with ribbon.
- 7. To make the opening more of a surprise, I always take up the crackers once they are completed and randomly pass them back out. The best option, in my experience, is to have a different classes make the crackers, so when students open theirs, they are surprised. You can decide to have students wait until they are home to open or open them in class. In class, students can open theirs individually, with a partner holding on end, or by having the entire class form a circle and crisscross hands and pull at the same time.







Christmas trees are in most homes in England. Some may have more than one. Families like to decorate the tree together. They also like to decorate their home with holly and mistletoe.





Ethiopian Drum

Materials:


Plastic Cup
Rubber Rand
Sheet of Wax Paper
Dry Beans
Markers


Procedures:

- 1. Give each child a plastic cup and piece of wax paper to decorate.
- 2. Fill each child's cup with just enough dry beans to cover the bottom of the cup.
- Instruct students to place the wax paper over the top of the cup and secure with a rubber band.

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4. Now, students can shake their 'drums' and celebrate!









A traditional Christmas dinner in Ethiopia include wat, which is a thick stew containing meat, vegetables and eggs. Wat is served on inera, a large flat piece of bread. Usually, pieces of injera are broken off to use as a spoon. The user will use the injera to scoop up the wat.

Christmas in Ethiopia is most certainly a time for church and family.

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



Shoe Craft


Purpose: French children place their shoes by the fireplace on Christmas Eve in hopes that Pere Noel (Santa Claus) will leave them toys and treats. Pere Noel is tall and thin, and he wears a red coat with fur trim.

Materials:

•Copy of Shoe, Candy Cane, and Lollipop (Cardstock works best, especially for shoe.) •Small Piece of Tissue Paper •Art Supplies – Markers, Crayons, Glue, Glitter, etc. •Scissors •Optional: Saran Wrap for Lollipops **Procedures:** Give each child a copy of a shoe, candy cane, and lollipop. 1. 2. Have students decorate with markers and art supplies. For an added touch, wrap the lollipop in a small piece of saran wrap and secure with tape. To complete, place a small piece of tissue paper and the candy cane and 3. lollipop behind the opening of the shoe and secure with tape or glue. For an added touch, you could create a fireplace bulletin board and have 4. students remove their shoes when arriving in France. An assistant could sneak away to place a small treat in students shoes while they are working on their shoe craft. 


The nativity scene is used as a decoration in many French homes. The French nativity scene is unique for two reasons: 1) the figures are made out of clay, not wood and 2) it includes figures such as a butcher, a baker, a policeman and a priest.

The French often burn yule logs made of Cherry Wood to make their homes smell nice. On Christmas Eve, the yule log is brought into the home and sprinkled with red wine. This helps it smell very good as it is burning.

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As the French say, "Joyeux Noël" (pronounced joy-yu noh-well) (Merry Christmas)!

Did you know that Santa Claus (Father Christmas) is known in France as Père Noël? In eastern France, Père Noël travels with Le Père Fouettard. Père Noël gives gifts to well-behaved children, while Le Père Fouettard disciplines the naughty children. Le Père Fouettard dresses in all black.

The nativity scene is used as a decoration in many French homes. The French nativity scene is unique for two reasons: 1) the figures are made out of clay, not wood and 2) it includes figures such as a butcher, a baker, a policeman and a priest.


The French often burn yule logs made of Cherry Wood to make their homes smell nice. On Christmas Eve, the yule log is brought into the home and sprinkled with red wine. This helps it smell nice as it is burning.

The French Christmas meal is called Réveillon. On the table are dishes such as roast turkey or goose, oysters, lobster, and cheeses. For dessert, a chocolate sponge cake log called a bûche de Noël is served. In some parts of France, thirteen desserts, made from different types of fruit, nuts, and pastries, are served!




Procedures:

Christkind visits homes on Christmas Eve to leave gifts for children. The Christkind is said to have blonde hair and wings. Christmas Eve is also the day that most German families exchange gifts. On Christmas, families gather for a Christmas meal. The main dish usually includes Carp or Goose and Stollen, a fruited yeast bread.

- Have students create a small design to fit on the smaller construction paper and glue.


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

The following day, December 6, is St. Nicholas Day. During the early morning hours, Sinterklaas travels to a city in The Netherlands. Every year he travels to a different city so as many children as possible can see him. With him is his servant Zwarte Piet (Black Peter). He keeps track of everything each child has done in the past year. Well-behaved children receive presents from Sinterklasss, while poorly-behaved children might get chased by Zwarte Piet who carries a stick! After church bells ring to signal their arrival, Sinterklaas parades through town on a white horse.

Christmas Day in Holland is much quieter with most of the focus on church services and family gettogethers. Children usually do not receive any gifts on this day as they have already received their gifts from Sinterklaas on St. Nicholas Day.


Procedures:


- 1. Print leaf template onto both red and green construction paper. Each student will receive a copy of each.

- 5. Flip the circle over and glue crumpled pieces of yellow tissue paper or holepunched pieces of yellow construction paper in the middle.





A known sign of Christmas in Mexico is the poinsettia. It is a bright red, star-shaped flower. It is said that a young boy walking to the nativity scene to see Baby Jesus soon realized he had no gift to give him. He soon thought to take green branches he saw nearby. When he got to the nativity scene, he put the branches near the manger. They bloomed right away into a poinsettia!

In Mexico, Christmas is celebrated from December 16th to January 6th. La Posada, which is Spanish for 'the inn', is the main Christmas celebration. It begins on December 16th and lasts for nine days before coming to an end on December 24. La Posada celebrates the part of the Christmas story where Mary and Joseph looked for an inn. Once a night, children are given candles and a painted board with Mary and Joseph. They call neighbors and sing a song at each home. For the first eight nights they are told there is no room in the house. Then, finally, on the ninth and final night, they are told there is room at the house and they may come in. Inside, the children celebrate with a party. At the party, they might play with a piñata. A piñata is a decorated paper-mâché object filled with candy and hung from an area high off the ground. To play, children are blind-folded and take turns hitting the piñata with a stick until the candy pours out.

When the families go to Christmas Eve church service, a baby Jesus is placed into the manger. Afterward, there are fireworks. In Mexico, children receive their presents on January 6, which is El Dia de los Reyes (The Day of The Three Kings). The presents are left by The Three Kings. On this day, many families eat a Three Kings Cake. Inside, a figure of Baby Jesus is hidden. Whoever finds the figure in their piece of cake becomes the 'Godparent of Jesus' for the year.

Saint Lucia's Day (Also known as Saint Lucy's Day) Candle Crown

Purpose: St Lucia was a young Christian girl who was killed for her faith in 304AD. She secretly brought food to the persecuted Christians in Rome. She would wear candles on her head so she would have both hands free to carry things. St. Lucia's Day is now celebrated by a girl dressing in a white dress with a red sash round her waist and a crown of candles on her head. (Normally electric candles are used for safety!) The crown is made of Lingonberry branches which are evergreen and symbolize new life in winter.

•White Sentence Strip


•One Page of Green Leaves (Copy onto green construction paper or cardstock) •Four Candles (Copy onto white construction paper or cardstock)

Yellow Crayon




Procedures:


- 1. Give each student a copy of the required materials.
- 2. Students will color the candle flames and then cut them and the leaves out.
- 3. Once all materials are cut out students should glue their leaves side-by-side onto their sentence strip.
- 4. Students will then glue their four candles on the inside of their sentence strip after evenly spacing them out along the strip.
- 5. Finally, the teacher or assistant will come around to measure the sentence (strip to fit on the student's head and staple it to make a crown.




